A MESSAGE FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

Our Local has seen many changes throughout its history, beginning well over 100 years ago. We've had many highs and lows in our work picture and our membership. Over the past several years, the continued demand for wiremen has increased our market share, membership, pay and benefits.



Despite the positive growth, I have seen division in our Local Union and across the United States. There are groups from the right and left side of the political spectrum battling each other with little regard for our common interests. Our Local Union continually takes heat for supporting legislation and candidates who support the interests of all working people: fair wages, protecting the right to form a union, protecting voting rights, and increasing work opportunities for the middle class.

The benefits we have achieved over our history can be lost with a swipe of a pen by lawmakers who desire to remove organized labor from our communities. Over the past 6 years, lawmakers have attempted to reduce our pensions, undercut our apprenticeship and restrict negotiations for collective bargaining agreements in an attempt to reduce the presence of Unions. At the same time, more and more workers are seeking the protection of Unions because they are being unfairly treated by their employers and they understand they'll have protection and a voice thru Union representation.

The strength of any Union is the Solidarity within the membership, a unity or agreement among individuals with a common interest and mutual support within the group. Local 570 has fallen short on this endeavor. Each month, the staff of our Local contacts and sends out notices to members about to drop their membership simply because paying their dues is not a priority. They continue to work for our union contractors earning wages and benefits negotiated by the staff of Local 570. They want the pay and benefits but they don't care about supporting the organization that provides it.

We are blessed the forefathers of IBEW were willing to step up to form our Union and provide our members with the protections and benefits not available to most workers. We cannot take these benefits for granted! We need to protect what we have by understanding our Collective Bargaining Agreements, showing up to union meetings, asking questions and sharing ideas. Make a commitment to be an active member. Stretch out a hand to greet new members and co-workers. There are people who are only working for the higher wages and have no desire to preserve our security – educate them.

Remember, our biggest strength is solidarity, working collectively. Please support the actions of your Local Union and International Officers, participate and volunteer at Local Union events and make the commitment to attend union meetings. If every member participated, we would be unstoppable!

June 10, 2022, fifty-five applicants advanced to the next phase of the selection process, a six-hour bootcamp on July 9, 2022. How to dress, pack your lunch, water, sunscreen, and hydrate two weeks prior to the event. Each participant arrived ten to fifteen minutes before our 5:30 am start time. Each potential apprentice receives a color-coded hardhat and placed in a group with eight strangers, all with the similar goal: a career in the electrical industry.

This bootcamp includes activities an apprentice will be expected to do. Climbing ladders using three points of contact, proper use of sweeping with a broom, lifting safely as they transport construction material from one station to another, keeping the worksite clean along with expectations and commitment to the trade.

Upon completion of this six-hour strenuous and worthwhile activities with the hope of receiving a position in The Apprenticeship, and their career in the electrical field begins.
